What would happen if **words** of trust and hope would come out of our mouths instead of words of worry? What would happen if **thoughts** of trust and hope would occupy our minds instead of thoughts of worry? Turning to God in faith and trust with positive words and thoughts might make a big difference in how we see life and we just might worry less and enjoy life more. I believe it is worth a try. God is the Ultimate Goal...Our ultimate goal is God. The search for holiness should be our primary purpose in life. At times, we do not have God as our ultimate goal. Instead we can be distracted by the pursuit of wealth. We cannot have two contrary goals. In the Gospel reading Jesus shows us the value of ordinary things, and teaches us to trust in God’s providence. Using simple examples and comparisons taken from everyday life, he teaches us to abandon ourselves into the arms of God. He exhorts us to go about our daily tasks serenely without worrying uselessly. How can we see God’s providence in action? Instead of giving from your abundance (after you have satisfied your needs), try giving a portion of the resources you need for your daily bread. When we have to rely on God’s provision, rather than our prowess, we experience tangible proof that he provides what we need. By living simply we have more to share with people in need.

This week we present an article by parishioner, Anita Fischer, concerning the upcoming Mass text changes. Anita is the director of the Office of Worship for the Diocese of Saint Cloud.

Introductory Rites - The Greeting

Then he [the priest] signifies the presence of the Lord to the community gathered there by means of the Greeting. By this Greeting and the people's response, the mystery of the Church gathered together is made manifest.

General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 50

Presider: **The Lord be with you.**

Assembly: **And with your spirit.**

The greeting for Mass is the first change the assembly will experience with the new Roman Missal. With the instruction *Liturgiam authenticam* calling for translations to adhere more faithfully to the Latin, the phrase *et cum spiritu tuo* is now translated, "and with your spirit." As indicated in the above quote from the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, the greeting at the beginning of liturgy is more than a simple hello. "The mystery of the Church gathered together is made manifest." This greeting calls us to be aware of Christ's presence in the Church, the gathered body of Christ.

This will not be new for some present in the assembly. Following the Second Vatican Council, the first English translation of the greeting was the same. It was the second Roman Missal that translated according to the instruction *Comme le prevoit* which called for "dynamic equivalent" translations. In other words, translators could take a Latin phrase and render an equivalent but not literal phrase in the translation. For example, the phrase "and also with you" intended to be similar to the Latin, but not literal.

The phrase "and with your spirit" closely follows scriptural greetings. In St. Paul's second letter to Timothy, he ends the letter by writing, "The Lord be with your spirit. Grace be with all of you" (2 Tim 4:22). When St. Paul addressed Timothy at the end of his letter he addresses both the part of him that is closest to Christ, his spirit, and also wishes grace upon Timothy's whole self. The priest, the leader of prayer in Eucharistic celebrations, is presiding *in persona Christi* (in the person of Christ). "And with your spirit," in the liturgy reminds us that it is the spirit of Christ in the priest that we are responding to in the greeting for liturgy. The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy reminds us that "the liturgy is considered as an exercise of the priestly office of Jesus Christ" and "is performed by the Mystical Body of Jesus Christ, that is, by the Head and his members" (SC, 7). It is God's spirit that gathers us together as a community to celebrate the mystery of the dying and rising of his Son who is present in this spiritual community. The act of gathering is important for this spiritual community in the liturgy as it unites us in the presence of Christ to give praise to God.

How do you experience the mystery of Christ in the spiritual community?

How do you greet one another?

Finance Update

The Finance Council is currently working on preparing a balanced budget for the 2011-2012 fiscal year. 82.5% of our income comes from our Stewardship of Offering; Sunday and Easter, Christmas, Thanksgiving and other Holy Days. A weekly average of our Sunday and Easter offering is printed in the bulletin each week to let us know how well we are doing in meeting our budget.

Other income for the parish comes from the July 4 festival (13%) and services and miscellaneous (4.5%). Revenue received in excess of what is budgeted for the festival is used for building repairs and improvements.

Year-to-date we are below our budget for Sunday offering income. We have also used our entire snow removal budget for the year and have one of the heaviest snow months ahead of us. This increases our budget deficit even more. If you are able to help decrease this deficit by giving more, please do so.

A goal of the Finance Council is for our parish to be a fully stewardship parish. In a stewardship parish, income from offering alone covers the cost of all ministries provided by the parish. This would mean we would not be dependent on our festival to cover operating expenses. Please help in our stewardship efforts by being attentive to your commitment of offering.
